# "Gandagi Mukt Jal Yukt Wetlands/ Water Bodies"

**BACKGROUND:** Earth Day is an annual event, celebrated on 22, April every year to spread awareness about environmental protection and acknowledge the global climate crisis. It was first celebrated in 1970, and is now coordinated globally by the Earth Day Network and is being celebrated in more than 193 countries each year. In India, Ministry of Earth Sciences and its Institutes are celebrating Earth Day on 22<sup>nd</sup> April every year. Earth day inspires people to commit to environmental protection. It encourages them to take action, however small, and be a part of the global movement dedicated to saving the planet we call our home.

When the team reached the spot, The area was completely littered with debris, plastic garbage, used household items, stones etc.

Understanding the cause, The NSS volunteers gave overwhelming response and went enthusiastically all around the river bank and picked wrappers, used disposable, plastic and litter lying scattered there. The wastes collected was later properly disposed off in the dustbins. All NSS Program Officers and ECO CLUB Members actively took part in the cleaning activity.
